Parker Foundation, our Chapter showed a wonderful outpouring of support to those veterans who are in-patient residents at either the Waco VA or the Temple VA hospitals. Our Chapter provided a full tub of toiletries, personal items, and socks, as well as a \$460 cash donation. Additionally, our Chapter made a \$300 donation to the Veterans One Stop service center for the annual Thanksgiving lunch to be held on November 16. If you would like to assist with the lunch (serving, cutting pies, replenishing trays and pans, etc.), come to the One Stop at 1000 on the 16^{th} . Lunch is served to the disabled veterans at 10:30 a.m. and open to all veterans at 11:00 a.m. Last year, more than 750 meals were served and your assistance is truly appreciated.

Our November 15 dinner meeting will be a special event and I encourage you to be there. We are presenting three scholarship awards to three Baylor AFROTC cadets. We will place each of the cadets at three tables and you may come early and sit at one of those tables. Listening to the youth and vigor of motivated cadets is simply amazing! Further, our guest speaker will be the Baylor University First Gentleman, Brad Livingstone. Mr. Livingstone has dedicated his professional career to secondary education. He currently serves as a history teacher at Vanguard Preparatory Academy. One of Mr. Livingstone's academic passions is World War II. At each stop in his career in education, he has taught a class on the subject in which veterans visit the classroom to share their stories with students. "I started the course well over 20 years ago at Vanguard, and I've taken it with me to Southern California and to D.C.," he says. "It's an incredible experience when I get to welcome World War II veterans into my classroom. These men are between 90 and 97 years of age, but they were only 17 or 18 — the same age as my students when they went to war." I am certain you will want to be there and listen to the stories, experiences, and thoughts from Mr. Livingstone. And in closing, "Never Stop Serving!"

GUEST SPEAKER – BRAD LIVINGSTONE

Baylor University First Gentleman Brad Livingstone has dedicated his professional career to secondary education. Brad and Linda Livingstone met at Oklahoma State University, where both played Division I basketball and were involved in Fellowship of Christian Athletes. This year, the Livingstones celebrated their 34th wedding anniversary.

A native of Okmulgee, Oklahoma, Mr. Livingstone was a three-year letter winner at Oklahoma State and toured Europe in 1983 as a member of an Athletes in Action basketball team, sharing the gospel and building bridges between cultures.

Mr. Livingstone earned a bachelor's degree in business management and a master's degree in education from Oklahoma State. He currently serves as a history teacher at Vanguard College Preparatory School, where he also taught in the 1990s and early 2000s when the Livingstones first lived in Waco. He previously served at Oaks Christian School in Westlake Village, California, and as the Dean of Students and a history teacher at Trinity Christian School in Fairfax, Virginia.

One of Mr. Livingstone's academic passions is World War II. At each stop in his career in education, he has taught a class on the subject in which veterans visit the classroom to share their stories with students. "I started the course well over 20 years ago at Vanguard, and I've taken it with me to Southern California and to D.C.," he says. "It's an incredible experience when I get to welcome World War II veterans into my classroom. These men are between 90 and 97 years of age, but they were only 17 or 18 — the same age as my students — when they went to war."

Mr. Livingstone has been recognized as Teacher of the Year five times by four educational organizations during his teaching career.

VETERANS DAY PARADE

The annual Veterans Day Parade in downtown Waco will be held on Monday, November 12th. Start time is 11:00 a.m. and commences on Austin Avenue around N. 13th Street, down Austin Avenue and ends at Waco City Hall.

NUMBER OF HOMELESS VETERANS **DECREASED IN 2018**

Secretary of Veterans Affairs Robert Wilkie and the Department of House and Urban Development (HUD) Secretary Ben Carson announced a decrease of 5.4 percent in the number of homeless veterans in the past year. "We've made great strides in our efforts to end Veteran homelessness, but we still have a lot of work to do to ensure those who wore our nation's uniform have access to stable housing," said HUD Secretary Carson. The annual Point-in-Time report estimates that 37,878 veterans experienced, or will experience homelessness in 2018, compared to 40,020 in 2017. The number of women veterans experiencing homelessness declined by 10 percent over the same time period. The VFW encourages homeless or atrisk veterans who need assistance to call 1-877-

4AID-VET (1-877-424-3838).

Also, an additional \$200,000,000 will be provided by the VA in 2019 to support homeless veterans. The funding is expected to support more than 13,000 beds for veterans in need across the country.

NINE MISSIONS WILL SOON RETURN TO **TYNDALL AFB, FUTURE OF BASE'S F22S** UNCERTAIN

Nine missions will return to Tyndall AFB, Fla., in the near future as the base begins to return to a sense of normalcy following the catastrophic damage of Hurricane Michael. These missions include the 601st Air Operations Center and nonflying portions of F-22 training. Air Force Secretary Heather Wilson announced Friday. All but 500 airmen from Tyndall will return to the Florida Panhandle within about three months, though the 95th Fighter Squadron—the only operational F-22 "Raptor" squadron assigned to the base-will be dispersed to other F-22 bases.

The airmen tasked with rebuilding Tyndall AFB, Fla., are pulling from the training they received at that base to help their own community. The 823rd RED HORSE Squadron, from Hurlburt Field, Fla., was one of the first to respond after Hurricane Michael destroyed about 95 percent of the base. The base was covered with sheet metal, insulation, furniture, and shattered trees. At first the job seemed too big, but the squadron immediately got to work clearing routes and assessing the damage. Temporary facilities were set-up to support personnel as recovery efforts continue.

ELDER ABUSE

Elder abuse is a very concerning problem and can occur in many different forms. It might be physical, psychological, financial, sexual, or even neglect. Any of these forms being perpetrated against an elderly person needs to be identified and stopped. The victim might need help to recover from the effects of the abuse and assurance the abuse will stop and not occur again.

Abuse can happen in many places, including the older person's home, a family member's house, an assisted-living facility, or a nursing home. Physical abuse includes hitting, slapping, and pushing. Emotional abuse includes saying unkind things to the person, yelling, speaking negatively, and criticizing the elderly person. With sons and daughters, financial abuse seems to be most common. It is justified by a belief that it is nothing more than the "advance inheritance" of property, valuables, and money.

The health consequences of abuse of an older person are serious. Abuse can destroy a person's quality of life and can result in depression and dementia, increased stress, psychological decline, malnutrition, and increased dependency. Research has shown the risk of death for elder abuse victims is three times higher than for non-victims.

Abuse comes in many guises, but the net effect is the same. Abuse creates potentially dangerous situations and feelings of worthlessness, and it isolates the older person from people who can help.

Because of the possibility of abuse in the case of elderly persons, it is important for the family members, caregivers, neighbors, and others to be aware and alert to see evidence of abuse should it occur. Fear of meddling in someone else's business should not stop one from reporting their suspicions. The reporting agencies in each state are different, but every state has a service designated to receive and investigate allegations of elder abuse and neglect. Many professionals, including psychologists and other mental health specialists who work closely with older individuals, are "mandatory reporters" according to state statute, which varies from state to state.

Sometimes older adults harm themselves through self-neglect (e.g., not eating or not going to the doctor for needed care), compulsive hoarding, or alcohol or drug abuse. However, one of the most difficult problems family members face is achieving a balance between respecting an older adult's autonomy and intervening before self-neglect becomes dangerous.

With the aging of today's population, there is the potential that elder abuse will increase unless it is comprehensively recognized and addressed.

2019 FEDVIP DENTAL AND VISION PLANS

Starting in 2019, dental and vision insurance plans for military retirees and their families will be available through the Federal Employees Dental and Vision Insurance Program (FEDVIP). If you're eligible, the first opportunity to enroll in a plan is during the Federal Benefits open season, which will take place from <u>Nov. 12 to Dec. 10.</u> To compare FEDVIP plans and rates before open season begins, go to <u>https://tricare.benefeds.com</u>.

WWI END - 100th ANNIVERSARY

World War I's armistice became effective on Nov. 11, 1918. U.S. casualties were hostile deaths 53,513; non-hostile deaths 63,195 and wounded 204,092. Most of the non-hostile deaths were due to an influenza epidemic that swept through stateside Army camps in 1918. More than 2 million U.S. troops served in Europe during WWI. Perhaps the most famous was U.S. President Harry S. Truman, who as a captain, commanded D Btry., 129th FA, 60th FA Bde., 35th Inf. Div. Side note was that American women (who were granted the chance to enlist in the military for the first time) gained the right to vote in 1919.

VA PRIORITIZING PENDING APPEALS FOR VICTIMS OF RECENT NATURAL DISASTERS

VA announced recently that they are prioritizing pending appeals claims for benefits of veterans impacted by recent hurricanes Florence, Michael, Maria and Super Typhoon Yutu. VA's Board of Veterans' Appeals determined that the effects of these natural disasters were sufficient enough to advance the appeals for veterans who live in areas determined to be disaster areas by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). "Accelerating the decision process on pending appeals claims for those Veterans and their families affected by hurricanes Florence and Michael is the right thing to do," said VA Secretary Robert Wilkie. The advancement on docket (AOD) for these storms is expected to last for six months from the date of the events.

NOVEMBER IS NATIONAL VETERANS AND MILITARY FAMILIES MONTH

President Trump declared November 2018 the second annual National Veterans and Military Families Month to "salute the brave and dedicated patriots who have worn the uniform of the United States, and ... celebrate the extraordinary military families whose selfless service and sacrifice make our military the finest in the world." More than 300 national, regional, and local events are planned at VA hospitals, benefits offices, and cemeteries across the country.

NOVEMBER IS NATIONAL FAMILY CAREGIVERS MONTH

VA is honoring the estimated 5.5 million family members and friends who provide much-needed care for chronically ill, injured, or disabled veterans during National Family Caregivers Month. "Caregivers make tremendous sacrifices to address the daily needs of veterans who served our nation," VA Secretary Robert Wilkie said in a statement. "These mothers, wives, fathers, husbands and other loved ones deserve our recognition and support for all they do to care for veterans." The recent passage of the VFW-championed VA Mission Act of 2018 will expand eligibility for VA's program of comprehensive assistance for family caregivers of all eras of service. The expansion will occur in two phases, starting with eligible veterans who incurred or aggravated a serious injury in the line of duty on or before May 7, 1975, with further expansion to follow.

MAILING DATES TO OVERSEAS LOCATIONS

Military postal officials and the U.S. Postal Service have issued their suggested mailing deadlines for holiday packages and letters, for the best chance of getting them to military locations overseas in time for Christmas. To get them there in time for Hanukkah, which starts on Dec. 2 this year, subtract 23 days from the deadlines.

The deadlines for various methods of shipping are the same for most APO/FPO/DPO (diplomatic post office) ZIP codes, with the exception of some mail going to APO/FPO/DPO Zip Code 093, which covers overseas contingency areas.

- USPS Retail Ground mail (the slowest way to go, formerly known as Standard Post): Nov. 6.
- Space Available Mail (SAM): Nov. 27.
- Parcel Airlift Mail (PAL): Dec. 4.
- First-Class and Priority Mail (letters, cards and packages): **Dec. 11**, except for ZIP 093, which is **Dec. 4**.
- Priority Mail Express Military Services: **Dec. 18.** Not available for ZIP 093.

You've got time to plan within your budget. Check with your local post office to compare prices of the ways to send your package.

VIETNAM WAR MARINE RECEIVES MEDAL OF HONOR

President Trump presented retired Marine Corps Sgt. Maj. John L. Canley the Medal of Honor at the White House before a crowd of Canley's fellow Vietnam veterans and senior military and civilian officials. The Marines who fought alongside Canley in the Battle of Huế had worked for years to see him receive the award – an upgrade of the Navy Cross he was awarded in 1970. Canley, now 80, is the 300th Marine to receive the Medal of Honor. On Jan. 31, 1968, with his company commander severely wounded, then-Gunnery Sgt. Canley took control of Alpha Company, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines, as it made its way toward the besieged city of Huế in central Vietnam. For the next six days, writes Stars and Stripes, Canley would organize assaults on enemy positions, killing countless enemy fighters as his team retook buildings in the city, according to award citations. Twice he would brave fire to scale a wall in "full view of the enemy to pick up wounded Marines and carry them to safety," said the president, adding that Canley had saved at least 20 Marines' lives during the "house-to-house" fighting.
