RURAL MENTAL HEALTH BILL BECOMES LAW

In early July, the president signed into law S.1468, the Sgt. Ketchum Rural Veterans Mental Health Act of 2021. Sgt. Brandon Ketchum served in the Marine Corps, completing tours in both Afghanistan and Iraq. In his first tour alone, he cleared 92 roadside bombs in 7 months - service that earned him a Combat Action Ribbon. In 2016, Sgt. Ketchum died by suicide after he was denied access to mental health services at a VA facility in Iowa, related to his battle with post-traumatic stress disorder. This law will require VA to report an assessment of health needs for rural and highly rural veterans and provide an account of VA's outpatient mental health care, residential programs, and VA's Rural Access Network for Growth Enhancement (RANGE) program cost savings.

NATIONAL PARK ACCESS FOR VETERANS BILL INTRODUCED

In early July, Rep. Miller-Meeks introduced the Veterans in Parks Act, which would provide free access to national parks and public lands for service members, veterans, and their families. This bill would codify the existing benefits of the annual America the Beautiful Pass, ensuring that those who qualify for the pass would have a lifetime of free access to more than 2,000 of our nation's parks and federal recreation areas.

BUDGET PROCESS STARTED ON NDAA

The House and Senate Armed Services Committees have started the process of marking up their chamber's version of the FY 2022 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA). Both chambers aim to close out most of the markup process before Congress adjourns for its annual August recess and elected officials return to their home states, though other competing priorities on the Hill may change those plans.

The House already has introduced its version of the FY 2022 NDAA, containing topline funding for defense programs. As for the Senate, there is no publicly available version yet. However, this is not unusual; the bill worked on by the Senate Armed Services Committee will typically be formally introduced as the original version to the full Senate rather than being introduced prior to or during the subcommittee/committee markup process. Much of the authorizing process, under Senate rules, is done during closed sessions. Consideration by committee is one of the first hurdles any bill, including the NDAA, must overcome in the legislative process. It is also the hurdle where most legislation stalls and, as a result, does not advance any farther. Markup is the final step in the committee consideration phase of the legislative process: The subcommittees and full committees will deliberate the bill in session, then vote on whether to report it out of the subcommittee/full committee.

How hard is it to clear this hurdle? Of the 16,601 introduced in the 116th Congress (2019-2020), only344, or 2%, became enacted laws.. That's down slightly from the 115th Congress, when 13,556 pieces of legislation were introduced and 443 were enacted, about 3%. This single-digit percentage has been the trend for the last five decades. Despite these low numbers, Congress has successfully passed the NDAA into law for 60 consecutive years. There is no law that requires Congress to do this; the NDAA is still just a bill, like any other legislation.

- Wednesday, July 28: House subcommittees on Cyber, Innovative Technologies, and Information Systems; Strategic Force; Seapower and Projection Forces; and Military Personnel.
- **Thursday, July 29:** House subcommittee on Tactical Air and Land Forces; Readiness; and Intelligence and Special Operations.
- Wednesday, Sept. 1: Full House Armed Services Committee Markup.

The NDAA is not a budget bill; unlike the 12 appropriations bills, not passing the NDAA by Oct. 1 won't result in a funding lapse or a shutdown. However, the annual NDAA establishes new DOD policies and programs and can re-authorize programs set to expire; without timely passage of both appropriations and authorization legislation, significant issues can arise with the military pay raise, high-quality health care coverage and other support programs. • Texas Public Policy Foundation Poll: over 70% of voters felt property relief is a major issue

• Texas Public Policy Foundation ranks Texas as having the 6th highest property tax rate nationally:

• HB 988 passed Jun 16, 2021 relating to ad valorem taxation; creating a criminal offense. Bill has 31 sections attempts to make a more accountable tax system

• Governor Abbott added property tax relief to the July 2021 special legislative session; however, lack of a quorum has prevented action.

• Several house bills relating to limitations on amount of ad valorem taxes a taxing unit may propose and constitutional amend on the same (HB 78, 122, 126, 182, 223, HB291: HJR2, 4, 6, 11, 17, 21, 24, 25, 28) all filed in Jul 2021

VA AND AGENT ORANGE PRESEUMPTIVE CONDITIONS

To qualify for Agent Orange-related VA benefits, veterans must have one or more of the conditions VA presumes to have been caused by exposure to the herbicide, including: Chronic B-cell leukemia, Hodgkin's disease, Multiple myeloma, Prostate cancer, Respiratory cancers, Soft tissue sarcomas, AL amyloidosis, Chloracne, Diabetes mellitus type 2, Ischemic heart disease, Parkinson's disease, Early-onset peripheral neuropathy, and Porphyria cutanea tarda. VA officials added three new Agent Orange presumptive conditions in May 2021; these were bladder cancer, hypothyroidism and Parkinsonism.

COST OF LIVING ALLOWANCE WATCH

The June 2021 CPI is 266.412, 5.1 percent above the FY 2021 COLA baseline. The Consumer Price Index for July is scheduled to be released Aug. 11. The CPI baseline for FY 2021 is 253.412.

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PASSPORT INFO UPDATE FROM CONGRESSMAN PETE SESSIONS OFFICE

As you plan to travel overseas, please take note that the U.S. Department of State is currently experiencing a significant influx of applications and massive backlog, due to disruptions from the COVID-19 pandemic.

The State Department currently has a backlog of between 1 and a half million to 2 million applications. Therefore, they are prioritizing high risk applicants, particularly those with life-or-death travel situation and are unable to guarantee appointments for all travelers.

We understand that you may be in need of a new passport or passport renewal. My office is working hard to assist you in a timely manner and ask you remain patient as we work with the State Department's extended waiting period. Those with non-life threatening, or non-time sensitive situations, should wait to obtain new or renewed passports, as this will help the State Department prioritize effectively.

APPOINTMENTS

- Routine passport service can take up to 18 weeks from the day a customer submits their application to the day they receive a new passport. The 18-week timeframe includes up to 12-weeks for application processing and up to six weeks for mailing times on the front and back end.
- Expedited passport service can take up to 12-weeks from the day a customer submits their application to the day they receive a new passport. The 12-week timeframe includes up to six weeks for application processing and up to six weeks for mailing times on the front and back end.
- If you are trying to get a passport, we highly recommend you plan for a 12-to-18-week processing time frame.

PASSPORT TIPS

- Send application via trackable mail.
- Pay extra fee for 1-2 day delivery.
- Check that your passport will not expire for 6+ months after trip starts in case of unexpected delays while traveling out of country.
- Do not wait until it is about to expire.

PHILIPS'S RECALLS SPECIFIC SLEEP AND RESPIRATORY CARE DEVICES

Philips has released a recall notification for several of their Bi-Level PAP and CPAP devices, such as Dream Station. Potential health risks such as headaches, nausea, and cancer have been identified with the polyester-based polyurethane foam that reduces the machines' noise. Philips recommends that patients using Bi-Level PAP and CPAP devices discontinue use and consult their physicians. However, patients using life-sustaining mechanical ventilator devices should not discontinue use without consulting their physicians. HOUSE HEARING ON VA EXTENDED CARE PROGRAM

At end of July, the House Veterans' Affairs Subcommittee on Health conducted a hearing on access to VA's home and community-based services. Ideally, these services allow veterans to remain in their homes and receive support as they age. Executive Director, VA Office of Geriatrics & Extended Care Dr. Scotte Hartronft addressed VA's focus on expanding these services, as well as modernizing and improving systems for healthy aging including facility-based care, technological access, and geriatric expertise.

KENDALL BECOMES NEXT SECAF AND OTHER SERVICES

The Senate confirmed Frank Kendall III to be the 26th Secretary of the Air Force on July 26, ending a nomination process stalled by holds from three senators. Kendall, the former No. 3 official in the Pentagon in the Obama administration, will take over a service pressing Congress for permission to retire aging airframes and overhaul its fleet to prepare for future conflict with near-peer countries, such as China. Under the Obama administration, Kendall served as the under-secretary of defense for acquisition, technology and logistics at the Pentagon between 2012 and 2017. He was previously the vice president of engineering at Raytheon.

This latest move fills two of three military service positions. Christine Wormuth was confirmed as the first female Army secretary in May; Carlos Del Toro, nominated to lead the Navy, still awaits a vote.
